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Introduction

Keep a lucky coin or charm in this cute little keeper necklace. To make this design, start with even-count peyote stitch, then follow the steps to turn it into a little pouch.

D11 - Size 11/0 Miyuki Delica Seed Beads

- S11 Size 11/0 Czech Seed Beads
- S15 Size 15/0 Seed Beads
- B4 4mm Czech Bicone Crystal

Step 1

Cut a long strand of working thread. Plan to add thread at least once. Leave a 20-inch tail. Using even-count peyote stitch, create the full pattern. Try to end with lots of remaining working thread which can be used to complete next steps.

Step 2

Weave the 20-inch tail thread left at Step 1 down through the edge to exit from what will become the bottom on the pouch. Leave that thread aside for now. Work next steps with the leftover working thread.



Step 3

Fold the rectangular piece of peyote in half. Use the working thread; it will be at the bottom on the ending side. Use it to zipper stitch the sides together. Leave the tail alone, it will be used in Step 6.


Step 4

After you zipper, your thread will be at the top of the pouch. Weave it through the top column. Weave to exit from the center D11, heading down toward the flower. Sting (1)B4 and (1)S15. Go back through the B4 and continue through the D11 your thread was exiting. Weave to reinforce.

Step 5

Weave around the top of the pouch to exit from one of the center, two D11 on the back. String (16) beads, alternating S15 and S11. Go through the adjacent D11. Test fit with the bicone. Reinforce this through twice.

If you have enough remaining thread, head to the nearest side point. If running short, weave in and trim thread.



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
Step 6

Switch to using the tail thread we wove down in Step 2. Use that thread to join the bottom of the pouch. Exiting one D11, go through the D11 across from it. Turn to come down through the adjacent D11, then join it to its opposing D11. Repeat this to the end to secure the bottom. Weave in and trim remaining thread.



Step 7

Create a chain. Weave in a new strand, or weave the thread leftover from Step 5 if it was long enough, to exit from a bead centered at one of the sizes. String a chain of S11 and S15 alternating. Join the end by going through a bead on the other side of the pouch. Weave through two D11 beads below to head back up through the D11 and through the chain, all the way through to reinforce to the other side. Weave in and trim remaining thread.







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
